She once worked as a medical assistant in a doctor's office and decided to come to Owens to study nursing.

"It's very difficult to go back to school as an adult," Grey said. "I was a little uneasy about competing with younger students." However, she found that she enjoyed her coursework, and she has helped her classmates as much as they have helped her. Grey said "I didn't have a lot of pride in my ability at first" but she did so well that she was invited to join the Honors Program in her second semester at Owens.
