#### **VISION**

As the premier two-year college in northwest Ohio, Owens Community College will be the first choice for students seeking career credentials and university transfer, and will be recognized as an indispensable partner for businesses, educational institutions and community organizations.

#### STRATEGIC PLAN 2019-2022

# **GOAL 1: Increase enrollment, completion and student success**

Advising hosted registration awareness events for current students on both campuses at various locations, November 14. Overall, the advising team spoke with 115 current students to encourage registration for next semester.

Admissions welcomed student groups to campus in November. Student talk with faculty and staff in various areas including advanced manufacturing, welding, dental, transportation, business, and fine and performing arts. Students also learn about support services, take a campus tour, and have lunch on campus:

- +40 students from EHOVE Career Center on November 10
- + 40 students from Bowsher High School on November 18
- + 50 students from North Central High School on November 21

In the community, Admissions represented the College at the Military Appreciation Night at the Toledo Walleye game, November 18. They spoke with Walleye fans and families about Owens programs and support services.

Student Financial Services continued to offer in-person FAFSA workshops on Friday mornings in Heritage Hall for both prospective and current students. Students do not need to be interested in attending Owens for them to attend the workshop. The FAFSA workshop provides personalized assistance with the FAFSA application for students and family members to complete as well as lays out next steps for admissions and registration. Most issues that may be encountered can be troubleshooted; however, for those that are not able to be resolved the student is directed to contact the Department of Education for resolution.

• ProMedica invited Student Financial Services with Admissions and TRIO Educational Opportunity Center presented a FAFSA Workshop, November 8.

• Liberty Center High School invited Ashley Foster, Director, Student Financial Services to facilitate a FAFSA workshop for their College and Career Fair Night, November 14.

Clark State College enrollment team visited the College to collaborate and discuss perspectives regarding student onboarding, the structure of staff and physical space, events, and student services. The following representatives from Owens were in attendance: David Shaffer, Executive Director of Student Services; Yasmine Bachar, Director of Advising; Erin Kramer, Director of Admissions; Marcos Gomez, Assistant Director of Admissions; and Angela McGinnis, Manager of Career and Transfer Services.

Food, Nutrition & Hospitality department reinstated intermittent lunches for the public at the Terrace View Café. The events are student developed and managed (e.g., FNH 130 Dining Room & Beverage Management, FNH 271 Garde Manger, and FNH 112 Fundamentals of Food Production) allowing students to research, to plan, to coordinate, and to produce high quality food items at a larger scale than what is completed in regular class days. Tasks included development of a theme and menu, recipe decision processes, staffing assignments, bulk food item ordering, and serving the meal. In the end, these events allow our students to experience the pressures, stresses, and expectations inherent in the food service industry, but in a controlled environment with support and guidance.

High school students from Penta Career Center, Oak Harbor, and Port Clinton high schools toured and spoke with current students in the Radiography, Sonography, and Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) programs.

#### **GOAL 2: Improve and enhance the student experience**

The NJCAA Division III National Runners-up Women's Volleyball team will be recognized at halftime of the women's basketball game on Wednesday, December 7 in the SHAC. The women's volleyball team made it to the national championship game the past four seasons. This year, the team had an overall record of 29-7 and 13-1 in the OCCAC. The team won its 17<sup>th</sup> OCCAC title since 2001 and this was the 6<sup>th</sup> straight year the Express qualified for the national championships. In addition, Coach Sonny Lewis was inducted into the NJCAA Volleyball Hall of Fame at the national championship this year. Congratulations!

A Transfer Fair was hosted on the Findlay-area Campus, November 9. Facilitated by Career and Transfer Services, about 11 colleges/universities and 22 students participated in the Transfer Fair. In conjunction with the Transfer Fair, Student Life held a Chili Cook-Off, and about 50 people tasted the chilis and voted for their favorites. The winner was Biologically Appropriate Chili, by Tara Carter and Bob Connour, who are Owens science faculty members.

Second-year Dental Hygiene program students participated in the Kids Access to Dental Care Day, October 3, on campus, providing free dental care to area children 1-18 years of age. The second-year dental hygiene students presented their informative poster session that was judged by area dental hygienists, faculty and staff. On October 22, Dental Hygiene students provided Oral Cancer Screenings at the One Matters Tent City event to bring awareness to Homelessness. Kimberly Moore, full-time faculty, was accompanied by adjunct faculty Brittany Moore, Vielka Cover, and Amy Saltzstein. Over 75 individuals were screened for oral cancer and referred for dental treatment. Also, the second year Dental Hygiene students and adjunct faculty raised funds for the Miles for Smiles 5K run/walk to benefit the Dental Center of Northwest Ohio that provides access to dental care to underserve in the community.

Music Business Technology students presented the second concert of the 2022-23 Accent on the Arts series on November 30 in the Mainstage Theatre. Academy Brass shared *an evening of Baroque, Classical to Jazz, Pop, Big Band and Holiday music!* Accent on the Arts is a free concert series designed, booked, promoted by students.

All in the Timing was presented at the Center for Fine and Performing Arts, November 10-13. Christopher Smith, alumnus, and John Toth, adjunct faculty, directed the fall theatre production. The show included six Owens students acting in the production alongside three alumni. Two Owens students served as stage managers along with two alumni. Technical Direction, Sound Design and Lighting Design was by Rick Clever, Technical Director, and Nichole Newman, Costume Shop Manager, served as Costume and Properties Designer.



The goal of the College's BIG Read is to bring awareness of different perspectives through books and accompanying activities on campus and in our surrounding communities.

- ➤ The EVAC project, Experiencing Veterans and Artists Collaborations, opened, October 31 at the Walter E. Terhune Art Gallery. The exhibit showcased printed artwork from stories from different war veterans. A reception was held, November 10.
- ➤ Owens Community College Radio regularly host Jen Hazel, Professor, English, and Jane Berger, Director, Library Services, "Let's Talk Big with Jane and Jen." about The Big Read.
- The Library hosted its third annual Human Library with 12 "human" books in an effort to break down stereotypes, November 3. Each book had a 15-minute conversation with a human reader about their title (topic). The goal of these conversations is to open dialogue in a safe space in the hope that readers will be educated and any stigma that surrounded the book's title can be eliminated. The goal of a Human Library is for readers to "unjudge" someone simply by learning more about them.
- ➤ Ms. Hazel and Ms. Berger delivered a revitalized bookshelf filled with donated books to the Cherry Street Mission, as part of the BIG Read(ing) Shelf with the goal of connecting individuals and families with books.
- ➤ Ms. Hazel, Ms. Berger, and Dr. Michelle Arbogast, Chair, Education and Human Services, delivered donated toiletries and clothes to the Zepf Center as part of a Big Read Community Engagement Activity.

# **GOAL 3: Develop workforce and labor market outcomes**

Career & Transfer Services hosted:

- Professional Interview Experience and Networking event, November 2. About 25 students completed mock interviews with area employers.
- Pop-Up Career Closet, November 8. About 6 students participated and received professional clothing for entering the job market.
- Virtual Job Fair via College Central Network, November 9-15. About 60 employers and 20 job seekers participated.

• "Utilizing the Workplace for Mental Health Stability" work shop with Jodi Rupp, Mental Health Professional, as the speaker, November 15. The event was included in the Big Read activities for this academic year.

School of STEM hosted a job fair, October 4 with 10 area employers and 44 Owens Community College students participated. Media coverage of the event included the Toledo Blade and Channel WTOL 11 news, with the STEM Internship Manager, Pete Kowal making a brief appearance on the 11 o/clock news coverage that night!

Veterans Services hosted the first annual Veterans Luncheon, November 10, to honor student veterans, employee veterans and others who are military-affiliated. There were 17 veterans and 6 veteran employees, about a total of 45 people were served. The guest speakers were Tim Hauser, Desert Storm veteran who spoke on the PACT Act and burn pits; and, advocate Susan Zeier of Sandusky, Ohio; the PACT Act was named after her son-in-law, Sergeant First Class Heath Robinson who served in the Ohio Army National Guard in Kosovo and Iraq as a combat medic; he died from lung cancer in 2020. Owens staff also presented services and resources for students in areas of prior learning assessment, career and transfer services, TRIO Educational Opportunity Center, and a representative from the Veterans Administration presented on the process to sign up for VA medical services. This was a meaningful event, developed by Veterans Services staff. Sharron Pappas, Manager, Veterans Services, attended the Findlay roundtable in August on the PACT Act and met Ms. Zeier at that event. There is only one student chosen nationwide following an application and interview process. She will be a full-voting member of the Society of Vascular Ultrasound Board for the 2023 calendar year. She will succeed Jordyn Rife who is a 2022 Owens Community College graduate. This is the third year in a row that an Owens student was chosen for this position.
- Russ Bodi, Professor, English and student Adam Keeler attended the Ohio Shakespeare Conference October 27-29. Mr. Keeler won the M. Rick Smith prize for the best undergraduate essay at the Ohio Shakespeare Conference. His essay, "Shakespeare? In This Economy?" examined the issue of how a podcast of Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet affected non-Shakespeareans. Mr. Keeler's essay earned him \$200, but the feedback from conferees was another unexpected reward. Plenary speaker Sujata Iyengar raised some points about Mr. Keeler's essay in various sessions and she offered him some advice on further exploration of his topic. Thus, with much feedback from other conferees, Mr. Keeler accomplished what many scholars would love to receive--conference "buzz." Because of his win, Mr. Keeler has been invited to submit his essay for publication in the conference journal. With that in mind, he will finish the semester with revision for publication in mind. Mr. Keeler's win also marks the third win for an Owens scholar over the past three years.
