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ACCREDITATION ACTIVITIES

Preparation of the portfolio report for the Higher Learning Commission's (HLC) mid-cycle visit, September 18-20, is underway. Report templates, a data collection process and communication plans are being developed. Members of the executive leadership team and others attended the HLC annual conference, March 25-28. A college-wide launch in early April is anticipated. The focus of the September visit will follow up on student assessment reporting, and the portfolio report will document how the College meets the criteria for accreditation.

PROGRAMS AND INITIATIVES

Magnetic Resonance Imaging and Diagnostic Medical Sonography and Vascular Sonography programs have a new affiliation agreement with Parkview Health System in Fort Wayne, Indiana. Three Diagnostic Medical Sonography students and one Vascular Sonography student have committed to jobs at Parkview and will be completing final clinical rotations at the facility.

Radiology Technology students and Magnetic Resonance Imaging students and faculty participated in an interprofessional educational activity. Students in each of these disciplines shared arthrography imaging procedures, anatomy demonstrated, and pathology with each other during a presentation and debrief. Interprofessional education in health education sets the foundation for interprofessional practice in the health care setting.

Catherine Ford, Dean, School of Nursing and Health Professions, and Irene Jones, Chair, Nursing with nursing leaders from ProMedica and the University of Toledo are exploring options to increase the number of nursing program graduates to better meet the critical nursing shortage.

PROGRAMS AND INITIATIVES

The Cyber Security degree was approved by the State of Ohio. In the past months, eight new IST Certifications were added to the College Catalog for students to earn significant endorsements and to provide nontraditional students from business and industry a path to seek additional education to support their careers in the IT field. Also, in ten different IST courses students may earn IT industry certifications as part of the course work.

Ohio Department of Higher Education approved the transition of all of the IST degree programs from Associate of Applied Business (AAB) degrees to the Associate of Applied Science (AAS) degrees and approved the renaming of those programs:

- Computer Programming & Development AAS
- Computer Networking & Systems Administration AAD
- Computer Systems Technologies & Support AAS
- Cyber Security AAS

STRATEGIC PLAN 2019-2022

GOAL 1: Increase enrollment, completion and student success

Admissions hosted the following events for prospective students:

- Toledo Tomorrow and Toledo Public Schools six high schools with more than 100 student visitors over a two-day period. A campus tour, lunch and programs featured: transportation technologies, business, criminal justice, culinary, technical arts, social work, humanities, and other Owens programs.
- President's Day Preview on February 20 with 62 prospective students and 147 total guests who took a campus tour, attended a selective health admissions information session, completed applications, learned about financial aid, academic programs and support services.
- School of Nursing and Health Professions Expo Day with more than 200 prospective students. Whitmer, Northview, Southview, Scott high schools and Horizon Science Academy students visited health facilities and met faculty and staff on the selective health admissions process and a presentation about careers in health care.
- With Career and Transfer Services, welcomed and hosted the Hancock County College Night with representatives from more than 50 colleges, and 54 prospective students, and 133 total guests. The College and Career Preview Night at the Toledo-area Campus with representatives from more than 60 schools, 167 prospective students and 352 total guests.
- Fine and Performing Arts department's Networking Fair and Symposium featured dynamic speakers and professionals in careers with an arts focus, including: graphic design, animation, photography, recording arts, broadcasting, theatre, music, music business and fine arts.

Student Financial Services and Student Accounts diligently worked and made outreach to 500 students, who were at risk of being dropped from classes due to non-payment of tuition and fees, over a four-week period. At the end of the period, there were 174 students who were dropped due to nonpayment of tuition.

Congratulations to the graduates who earned a total of 299 associate degrees and 316 certificates for Fall Semester 2022. Of the 299 degrees awarded, 77 were academic honors, achieving at least a 3.5 grade point average.

Students participated in the Oregon Road Film Series 48-hour film challenge on the weekend of March 24. Teams have a 48-hour period to create, write, shoot and edit a short film with a specific theme. Winners will be announced at the May Oregon Road Film Series showing.

The BIG Read hosted the Human Library on the Findlay-area Campus. Participants had the opportunity to "check out" human books to better understand someone who has experienced prejudice or has been stigmatized and ultimately, "unjudged." The Human Library is an international organization founded to help address people's prejudices by inviting them to conversations with people they might not have met outside of this experience.

The Big Read(ing) Shelf project will distribute two fully stocked bookshelves to two Findlay agencies: Findlay City Mission and Open Arms. The idea is for the patrons of these agencies to take books with them when they leave to start or enhance their own home library.

"Confronting Biases," panel discussion was presented by Andrew Erickson, Instructor, Philosophy; Jodi Gore, Instructor, Social Work; Kristin Price, Professor, Psychology; Keri Kovacsiss, Adjunct Instructor, Sociology; and Shannon Holleran, Adjunct Instructor, Psychology. The panel explored unconscious biases that revolve around race, gender, sexual orientation, religion, socioeconomic status, etc. that are in the background of our minds.

A trauma workshop was led by Jodi Gore, Instructor, Social Work, R.J. Johnson, Director, Counseling Services, and KaJuan Willis, Intern, Counseling Services, as part of The BIG Read semester activities. Counseling Center staff volunteer for the Junior Achievement national organization two times per month to teach Toledo Public Schools' students about emotion regulation and control.
